"How to Judge people"

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- The command
 - > "Do not judge, so that you are not judged;"
 - > Does the book of Matthew end right here?
 - > Are believers forbidden from judging?
- The justice of God's judgment
 - > "For with what judgment you judge, you will be judged;"
 - > "and with the measure you use, it will be measured back to you."
 - > Judgment is not forbidden but rather doing it the right way.

1- Understanding justice vv. 1-2

- Judgment in the Jewish-Law context:
 - > Carried out by the priests.
 - > Pronounced by the prophets.
- Judgment in the Church-Grace context:
 - > 1 Corinthians 5:1-5; 6:1-8
 - > 2 Thessalonians 3:6-7, 14-15
 - ➤ 1 Timothy 5:19-22

1- Understanding justice vv. 1-2

B. Summary/Application:

- Judging is not altogether condemned by Jesus but rather judgment that does not fully understand.
- We must understand that we too will be judged and that should impact the way we judge.
- In Jesus' context judgment was ultimately conducted through the religious system of the Mosaic Law.
- For the Church, judgment is ultimately conducted through the local church.

2- Avoiding hypocrisy vv. 3-5

- Three ways to avoid hypocritical judging –
- 1) Consider yourself v. 3
- 2) Don't be self-righteous v. 4
- 3) Be purified v. 5 (cf. Galatians 6:1-2)
 - > Cf. Mosaic law purification.
 - > Cf. 1 Jn. 1:9

2- Avoiding hypocrisy vv. 3-5

B. Summary/Application:

- Before you pull out the magnifying glass, pull out the mirror.
- Avoid a self-righteous perception of yourself... remember who you were, and who you are now by God's grace.
- Minister to others in fellowship with God. Make sure you are not neglecting anything in your own life.

3- Practicing discernment v. 6

- The proverb v. 6a
 - > "Do not give what is holy to the dogs;"
 - > "nor cast your pearls before swine,"
 - > Both word pictures communicate at least two things:
 - 1) Discernment
 - 2) Worth while ministry.(Shouldn't we minister in any situation?)
 - cf. Matthew 10:14
 - cf. 2 Timothy 2:14-18, 23-26

3- Practicing discernment v. 6

- The proverb v. 6a
- The consequence v. 6b
 - > "lest they trample them under their feet,"
 - > "and turn and tear you in pieces."
 - The imagery here is someone rejecting what you offer and turning against you personally.

3- Practicing discernment v. 6

B. Summary/Application:

- Jesus' audience was to practice discernment in who they offer help to.
- Believers today should follow this principle and focus their ministry efforts on those who are seeking.
- Finding this line of who to avoid and who to focus on takes discernment. IT might look different for people!
